Before the program started, Mr. Bertram Scott spoke briefly on the need for a Negro policeman in West Side Winter Park to handle an element there which makes life around Hannibal Square, the West Side business and shopping center, both dangerous and highly unpleasant for respectable Negroes, especially women and children. Mr. Scott told how Sanford to the north

of Winter Park and Orlando to the

south have solved this same problem with Negro policemen who patrol their beat on foot, hearing, seeing and understanding much that white police in a prowl car are bound to miss. This situation leaves our usually advanced little Winter Park still between these two other communities geographically but far behind them in civic good management.
