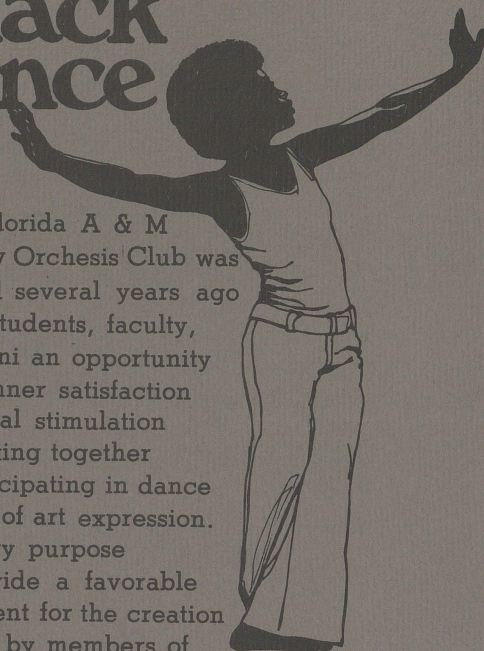

Black Poetry

Don L. Lee, renowned poet, essayist and critic, is currently stationed at Howard University in Washington, D.C. as poet-in-residence and is also publisher/editor of Third World Press in Chicago.

Published works of Lee include *Think Black; Black Pride; Don't Cry, Scream; We Walk The Way Of The New World* and *Directionscore, New And Selected Poems*. More recently Lee has completed the first book of criticism on the contemporary Black Arts Movement. He is also presently completing volume two of *Dynamite Voices* as well as a collection of his essays.

A number of Lee's works have appeared in a number of periodical publications, including *Black World [Negro Digest], The Journal of Black Poetry, Evergreen Review, The New York Times, Muhammad Speaks, Freedomways, Liberator, Free Lance, Nommo, The Chicago Daily Defender, Ebony* and others.

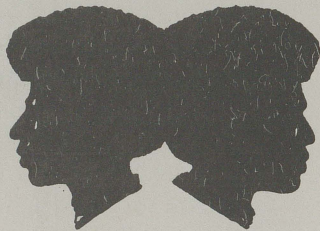
Soul Food Day

Tell It Like It Is

Born in the Black ghetto of St. Louis, Mo., Dick Gregory has now become the most sought-after speaker in America on college campuses today. Gregory, known under several titles such as recording artist, author, lecturer, actor, human rights activist, social satirist, critic and more, combines his many roles to serve the cause of human liberation and to alleviate human suffering brought on by ignorance and apathy.



During the civil rights movement of the 1960's, Gregory participated in every major (and most minor) demonstration for human rights in America. He devoted his time and talent to giving benefits for civil rights groups, peace groups and other clusters of people devoted to human liberation.

Gregory has received the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Malcolm X University (Chicago) and the degree of Doctor of Laws from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania.

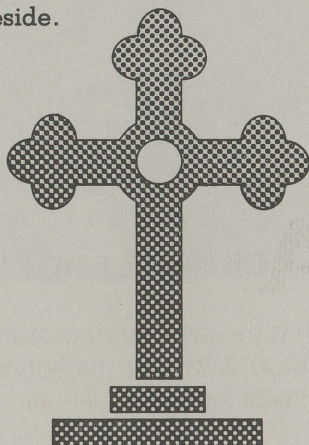

- To enlighten the Rollins community to the cultural, sociological and psychological factors which comprise the total Black experience.

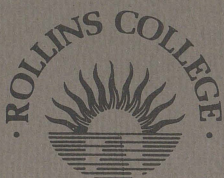
- To facilitate congenial race relations through education and open communication.
