

INTER-RACIAL AWARDS TO BE PRESENTED SUNDAY AT ANNIE RUSSELL THEATER

This Sunday, February 11th, is to be observed throughout the nation as Brotherhood Sunday—a fitting time for the white and colored people of Winter Park to gather together for the second annual presentation of the DePugh-Hall Award named for Mrs. Mary L. DePugh and Mr. Fred S. Hall, local pioneers in inter-racial cooperation.

The Inter-racial Committee has selected a representative of each race to receive the award, in recognition of outstanding work for the advancement of good race relations in Orange County. The presentation will be made Sunday afternoon at the climax of a special program presented by the Rollins Inter-faith and Race Relations Committee, at the Annie Russell Theater. Both white and colored people are invited to the program, which begins at 3 p.m., and the sponsors expect a large attendance.

Winter Park organizations as well as individuals were asked to submit the names of their candidates for the twin awards, which were conferred last year upon the late William A. Taylor and Mrs. Chanie Laughlin. This year, as last, the excellent Hungerford Singers are presenting a special concert for the event. Their se-
